Book Page Broach



- 1. Choose five book pages.
- 2. Use the scissors to cut out different sized flower shapes.
- 3. Optional: Crumple the book page flowers and flatten out with your fingers. This gives texture to your final product.
- 4. Stack the flowers by size with the biggest one on the bottom to the smallest one on the top.
- 5. Poke the brad through the center of the stack and open the legs on the back of the flower.
- 6. Hot glue the pin to the back of the brad.

Duct Tape Lanyard

- 1. Measure out 3 feet of duct tape.
- 2. Lay it out on the table with the sticky side up.
- 3. Carefully fold (lengthwise) one side of the duct tape toward the middle. It works best to start in the middle and work out to one side, then return to the middle and work out to the other side. (See picture above.)
- 4. Repeat on the other side, overlapping just slightly in the middle.
- 5. Make a loop (as if you were going to put it around your neck) with the seam facing up.
- 6. Put the ends of the loop through the metal circle.
- 7. Fold the pieces over the circle and tape them to the straps. Make sure your piece of tape is long enough to wrap around to the other side a little bit (2in x 1in strip of tape) (See picture above.)
- 8. Then flip it over and put another 2in x 1in strip of tape across to cover up the tape seam from step 7.
- 9. Hook the metal clasp onto the metal circle.

Clothespin Magnet



- 1. Use the template to cut out the material of your choice to cover your magnet (wallpaper, scrapbook paper, etc.)
- 2. Use the paint brush to paint glue onto the front of the clothespin.
- 3. Attach your material to the clothespin and press down.
- 4. Peel the paper off a magnet strip and attach to the back of the clothespin.

Fabric Rose



- 1. Choose a piece of fabric.
- 2. Tie a knot at one end, as close to the end as you can.
- 3. Run your fingers up and down the long sides of the fabric to give it a distressed look.
- 4. Holding the knot in one hand, begin twisting the fabric and wrapping it around the center knot. Place a dot of hot glue ever three twists or so to hold everything in place.
- 5. Continue doing this until you have wrapped the whole length of fabric into a rosette.
- 6. End the final twist on the back and trim off excess fabric.
- 7. Using your rosette as a guide, cut a round of felt that is slightly smaller.
- 8. Hot glue the felt piece to the back of your rosette.
